Dear Friends,

Nothing, it seems, is as certain as change – and for the most part there is little we like less than change. Change happens, but we don't have to like it! Our son and daughter-in-law in Pittsburgh are about to have their fourth child under 6 – their household is going to change from moderately chaotic to completely out of control. Our daughter and son-in-law in San Francisco are finally looking to leave there for a more family-friendly environment (translation: to where they can afford a house!). Just about everything is going to change for them, and a bit for us – we kind of liked our semi-annual visits in “the city by the bay” – but the travel will not change much, for we think they will stay on the West Coast.

Here at Prince George we are undergoing some changes too. As many of you know, it seems pretty certain at this point that Tom and Lauren will be leaving us in the late summer (Tom is taking a year of further legal training in Malta) and we will be “breaking in” a new parish secretary. I dread that is a change, and frankly sometimes I pray that something good happens to keep Tom and Lauren here (nevertheless, not my will, Lord, but Thine be done). Also, I have taken on more responsibility at the diocesan level on the Standing Committee – not a change I sought or welcomed. Further here at Prince George we have been working slowly through a vision process as a parish leadership team, which promises to give us a somewhat altered future. We have decided (“we” being your staff and Vestry) that it is time for us to pursue more intentionally the calling of Jesus Christ to be His body, His ministers, in our community – to grow not just within our walls in our faith and knowledge, but beyond our walls in our Christian witness and service. This change will not be radical or a complete change of direction –but simply an augmentation, a natural addition, to what we have done in the past and are doing already. Still, change is not easy, the process is not always enjoyable, and the costs are sometimes high.

Why do we change? Why should we be open to change? Why should we, in fact, *seek* change in our lives and our parish? Because living things grow, living things change – it is just a fact of life. Living means changing, and if we want to remain alive and in fact become ever more alive, then we must embrace change. Not to change is to die, it is that simple. Said another way, Jesus calls us to grow, and to grow is to change. Our task, our mandate, is to find what Jesus is calling us to grow into, how is He calling us to change, and then to be willing to let Him have His way in and through us.

I ask you to pray for us as a parish, that we *will hear* the Lord as to the changes He is calling us to make, and that we will all *embrace* the changes that the Lord has put before us, both individually and together.

A Message From Our Senior Warden

Our Rector was elected to serve on the Standing Committee of The Episcopal Diocese of South Carolina at the 2010 Diocesan convention for a three year term. Paul was recently honored, as he was elected president by the Committee for the 2011 term. The Standing Committee is somewhat like a Diocesan Vestry, with the role of the president something like that of a senior warden of a vestry. The Standing Committee is composed of six laypersons and six clergy, with regular meetings held in Charleston. Sub-committee meetings may be held more often, by phone when possible. Often times when we chose or are called upon to serve in the Parish in various capacities, we need to take time away from our "day jobs" in order to meet the demands of our service to the Parish. My purpose in making the Parish aware of Paul's added responsibilities is twofold: first, to note the esteem in which Paul is held within the Diocese by the laity and clergy, and secondly to ask for your support both by word and prayer as he presides over the Standing Committee during 2011.

Vestry Update:

The Vestry spent time considering the increased costs and work required to repair the Preschool Building water damage, which could run to \$60,000. We also discussed the progress toward developing a vision for the parish, and we considered using a consultant for fund-raising advice, and particularly a campaign to eliminate our debt and undertake some needed improvements. We revisited the need for an employment contract with the rector, especially considering his role on the diocesan standing committee, and the rector gave the vestry an update on various diocesan concerns and issues. We also reviewed our financial position after the first two months of the year, which is good aside from our debt which costs roughly \$3,000 per month to service. Finally, we listened as the Cemetery Committee described its preliminary review of our churchyard and noted the possibilities of making available more plots for burial.

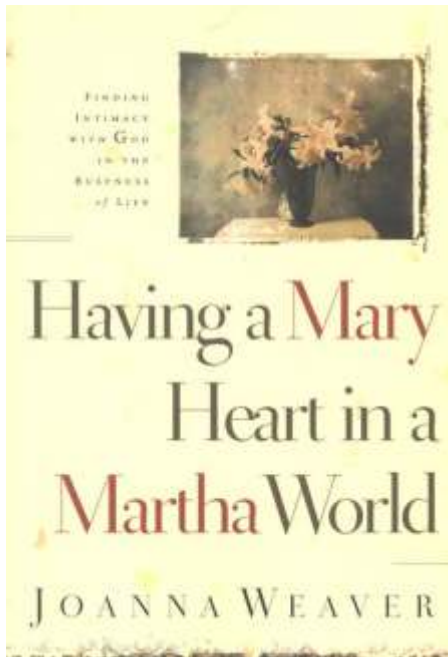

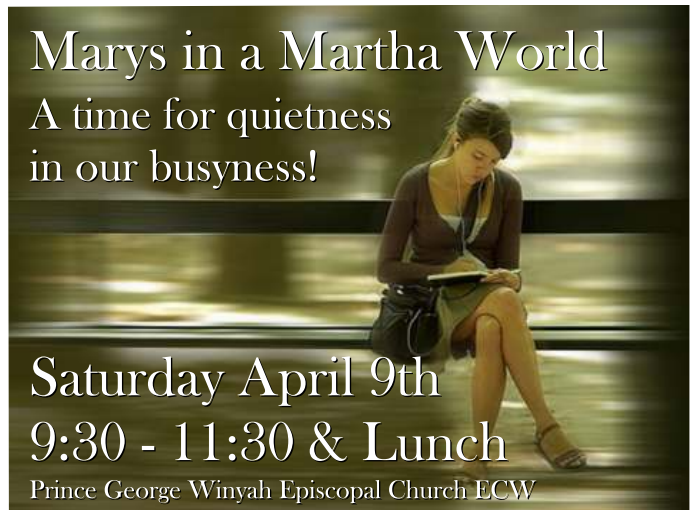

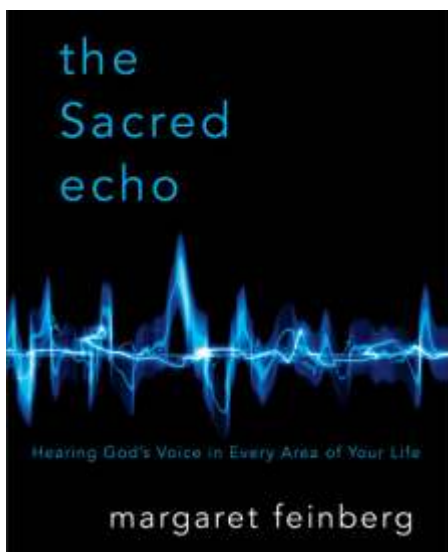

NOTES FROM THE CHOIR LOFT

7/11 to 24/7

Last week I was introduced to a new phrase by 3 different people. They all talked about 7/11 music which I initially assumed would be the kind of mindless background music one hears played in convenience and other stores. However, it turns out to be a pejorative way of describing contemporary praise music: in the mind of the people who use the expression it's 7 words sung eleven times.

I've done a bit of searching and the reality is that I can't find any contemporary music which comes close to fitting the description, although the *Amen* chorus from Handel's *Messiah* has 1 word repeated several hundred times!

Use of the expression may just be about a cultural preference, but I'm concerned that something more serious might be at its root, which is relevant to us and especially in Lent, and that is the fear of an intimate relationship with the Lord Jesus. If so, it is not cultural (in the sense of musical style) but spiritual, crossing continents and historical eras, simply finding it's current expression in the West in a dislike of songs in which the singer expresses other than detached praise to God. Now this is possibly a gross simplification and surely does not cover everyone, but even so . . .

Simple is linked to child-like but regularly confused with childish. The Apostle Paul encourages Christians to grow up in their faith, but very importantly Christ says unless we receive the things of God as children do, we cannot enter the Kingdom of God, and that's serious!

One of the hallmarks of a good relationship between a child and its parents is an intimacy in relationship. Whilst it is clear from the Bible that God is utterly pure, holy and un-approachable by sinners, Jesus also says we can address God Almighty, the King of the Universe, Creator of all things (visible and invisible), as father, papa, the one who delights in his children and rejoices over them with singing.

If we saw a human family situation where a young child would only address their father or mother in the most formal manner, and was unwilling to approach them for fear of retribution or rejection, then reasonably, we would be concerned. We might well assume that there was abuse happening or that the parents were in some way unable to love their child in a way which would encourage the child to return their love. But in the case of our heavenly Father this cannot even be considered.

For God loved the world in this way: He gave His One and Only Son, so that everyone who believes in Him will not perish but have eternal life.
John 3:16

And

God proves His own love for us in that while we were still sinners Christ died for us! Much more then, since we have now been declared righteous by His blood, we will be saved

through Him from wrath. For if, while we were enemies, we were reconciled to God through the death of His Son, [then how] much more, having been reconciled, will we be saved by His life! And not only that, but we also rejoice in God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have now received reconciliation.

Romans 5: 8 - 11

So God is not the one who prevents an intimate relationship with Him; sadly it is us. The primary block to intimacy with God is having no relationship with Him – there is only one way to the Father, and that is through Jesus. But for many who truly believe there are other reasons:

- We have never read scripture carefully so we don't know we can have an intimate relationship with God.
- We have misunderstood scripture or have a biased understanding of God as angry rather than loving.
- We have not learnt to love fully because of broken or lacking relationships with our human parents.
- Lack of trust / a need to stay in control.
- On-going patterns of unconfused sin in our lives that drive us away from God's presence.
- We continue to allow the lies of Satan to persuade us that God could never really love us.

The good news is that nothing can separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus – everything can be fixed. Read the Bible and ask the Lord to give you a fuller, better understanding of His character. Come to the Lord in prayer with others and seek His healing and wholeness for past relationships and freedom from Satan's lies. Invite God to take full control of your life. Read Luke 15: 11 - 32, see how much our Father longs to forgive and restore you, confess your sin and receive His love.

Brothers and sisters, we have a duty. Our duty is not to live under the control of our sinful nature. If you live under the control of your sinful nature, you will die. But by the power of the Holy Spirit you can put to death the sins your body commits. Then you will live.

Those who are led by the Spirit of God are children of God. You didn't receive a spirit that makes you a slave to fear once again. Instead you received the Holy Spirit, who makes you God's child. By the Spirit's power we call God "Abba." Abba means Father. The Spirit himself joins with our spirits. Together they give witness that we are God's children.
Romans 8: 12 - 16

Maybe then we can become the spiritually childlike of whom Jesus said:

From the lips of children and infants you, Lord, have called forth your praise.

Matthew 21: 16

And 7/11 will turn to intimate worship, 24/7, regardless of style.

We took some seniors to Camp St Christopher for a contemplative retreat March 25-27. This event is called Epic and is focused on studying scripture and meditating on it. This year's study was on the Book of Zephaniah, and it was a book that warmed our hearts. Well at least in a similar way to that of a rotisserie chicken. The books focus was on God's coming judgment as with many of the minor prophets. We see God's judgment over the complacency of faith, materialism, worship of other gods and the worst of all, pride. In this judgment the wicked will be taken away and a remnant will be left. The remnant that is left is saved even through great judgment. The text calls for God's people to humble themselves that they might be saved. We are promised that if we can humble ourselves, God is mighty to save from the coming judgment and 'in his love he will no longer rebuke you, but will rejoice over you with singing'. God's love and holiness cannot be separated. They are one burning fire of passion and purity. A fire that will burn with love, purify and consume. The Lord's Day that is spoken of in Zephaniah (that of Judgment) is a display of God's holiness and love. Ultimately God reveals his character over judgment. In the cross we see that God himself becomes the object of Judgment on our behalf so that we can return to him. For those that do humble themselves and repent, they will know that salvation only comes from God and will know the beauty of God in their hearts.
